



Future Perfect Tense

- The future perfect tense is used to describe an action that will have been completed at some point in the future.
- It is often used with a time expression which identifies that point in the future.

Forming the future perfect tense







Examples of the future perfect tense

- By the time you arrive, we will have finished the meal and the speeches.
 - "by the time you arrive" identifies the point in the future.
- I will have read every magazine in the waiting room before I see the dentist.
 - The clause "before I see the dentist" identifies the point in the future.



Examples – negative "will not have" + "[past participle"]

- By the time you arrive, we will not have finished the meal and the speeches.
- I will not have read every magazine in the waiting room before I see the dentist.



Example - question

- Will you have finished the meal and the speeches by the time I arrive?
- Will you have read every magazine in the waiting room before you see the dentist?



Function

- The future perfect tense refers to a completed action in the future.
- When we use this tense we are projecting ourselves forward into the future and looking back at an action that will be complete some time later than now.
- It is most often used with a time expression.

Examples

- I will have been here for six months on June 23rd.
- By the time you read this I will have left.
- You will have finished your report by this time next week.
- Won't they have arrived by 5:00?
- Will you have eaten when I pick you up?



Example sentences

- An action that will happen before another action in the future:
 - Jack will have finished his homework by the time his mother gets home.
 - She will have gotten ready by the time they leave the house.
 - Laura will have cleaned out the apartment before she gives back the key.

Example sentences

- An action that will happen before a specific time in the future.
 - By the time he graduates, he will have completed five years of study.
 - The snow will have stopped by April.
 - We are on vacation. So by the time we get back, we will have rested and relaxed.
 - By next month, you will have received your promotion.



Example sentences

- A state that will continue up to some time in the future. (It is usually used with states, not action)
 - Next Monday we will have been married for ten years.
 - Tomorrow Justin will have been single for a whole week.
 - Luke will have been sick for two weeks tomorrow.



positive

- By six pm. Tonight:
 - I will (I'll) have finished this book.
 - You will have studied the English tense.
 - She will have cooked dinner.
 - He will have arrived

MAHASARAKHAM

- We will have met Julie.
- It will have stopped raining.
- They will have left Japan.

negative

- By next week,
 - I will not (won't) have finished this book.
 - You will not have studied the English tense.
 - She will not have cooked dinner.
 - He will not have arrived.
 - We will not have met Julie.
 - It will not have stopped raining.
 - They will not have left Japan.



Question (yes/no questions)

- By next year,
 - Will I have finished writing this book?
 - Will you have studied all the English verb tenses?
 - Will she have graduated?
 - Will he have got married?
 - Will it have got colder?
 - Will we have met your boyfriend?
 - Will they have left their jobs?



Wh questions

- When will I have finished writing this book?
- Why will you have studied all the English verb tense by tomorrow?
- When will she have been here three weeks?
- Why will he have got married before June?
- Why will it have got colder by May?
- How will we have met your boyfriend by tonight?
- When will they have left their jobs?
